2019 Novel Coronavirus: Cloth Face Coverings and Executive Order 122

(Hardyston, NJ) On April 8, 2020, Governor Phil Murphy issued Executive Order 122, which includes a requirement that customers and workers of essential retail businesses wear cloth face coverings while on the premises, except if the individual is under two years old, or where doing so would inhibit the individual's health. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) has provided guidance regarding the use of cloth face coverings in slowing the spread of COVID-19. Recent research has suggested that a significant number of people who test positive for COVID-19 have mild or no symptoms, and those who develop symptoms can transmit the virus before symptoms appear. This indicates that the virus can spread between people who are not showing symptoms. To

combat such spread of the virus, New Jersey has mandated, based on CDC recommendations, the use of cloth face coverings in certain settings where social distancing may be difficult, such as in a grocery store or other retail business.

Cloth face masks can be made at no or low cost from common household items. They should fit snugly but comfortably against the side of the face, be secured with ties or ear loops, include multiple layers of fabric, allow for breathing without restriction, and be able to be laundered and machine dried without damage or change to its shape.
