Dear Brother Firefighters:

I am the Regional Disaster Officer of the American Red Cross's North Jersey Region. I am also a volunteer firefighter. As firefighters, we are well aware of the potential for serious injury or loss of life when an occupied residence catches fire. One of the most effective ways to reduce casualties in fires is to have functioning smoke alarms installed in the living areas of homes.

And, of course, if residents evacuate promptly, the savings in lives will include the lives of firefighters risking injury entering burning buildings to perform search and rescue operations.

Fortunately, the American Red Cross has a new national campaign to provide smoke alarms without charge, and install them in homes. As part of our preparedness initiative, we recognize that it is essential to maximize the number of smoke alarms installed in residences. We are focusing on those neighborhoods that are most at risk in order to have the maximum impact in terms of saving lives.


